

Trefoil Cross Pattern

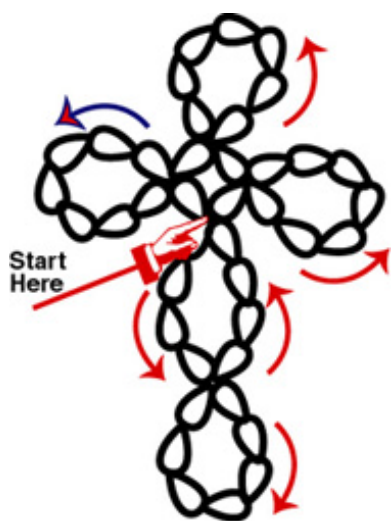
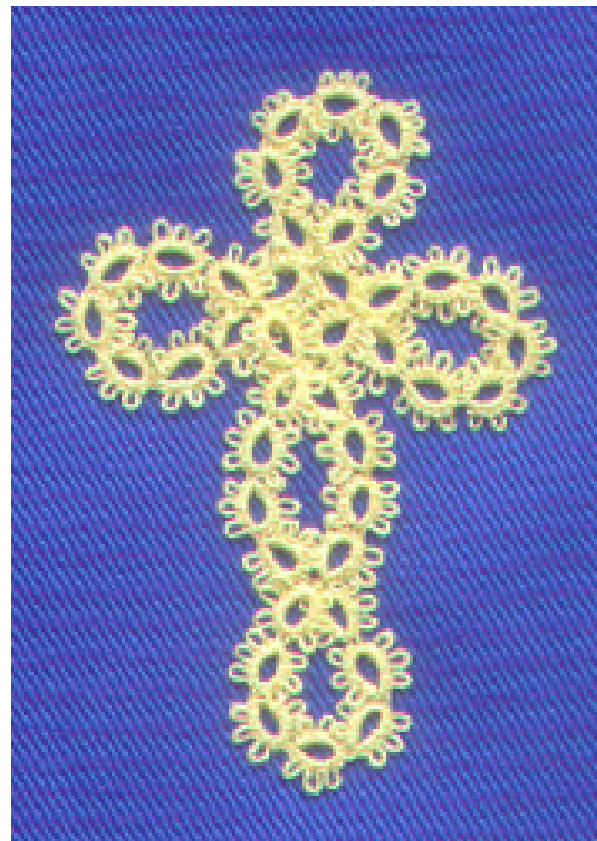
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Techniques used in this pattern:

Split rings and CTM(Continuous Thread Method)

Load two shuttles with your favorite thread. It would be best to use the CTM(continuous thread method) to avoid working in small ends later. So load one shuttle and then take off a fair amount of thread from the ball to load the other shuttle, keeping the two shuttles in tact. It would be a nice design if you used two colors so that half of the split rings would be edging the outside of the cross. Be creative.

The thread I used for this project is DMC cebelia cotton size 30.



This is a fairly simple pattern to execute as long as you know how to make split rings. All rings are the same. They are as follows: SR: 2-2-2-2/2-2-2-2, cl r. Start at the point of the bottom part of the middle intersection where you see the hand. Make the SR in the direction of the arrows starting with the blue arrow. Tie and work in ends.
